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"Knowledge and collective ability"

We frequently ascribe ability to bring about certain outcomes or act in certain ways to collectives of people. For example, we may say that a military unit can carry out a complex mission or that a group of protesters can storm a government building. Such collective ability is essential in particular in discussing whether a given collective can bear moral responsibility or obligations to act in certain ways.

However, philosophical discussion of collective action and collective responsibility, however, so far ignored the crucial concept of collective ability. In this paper, I aim to fill this gap by providing an account of when a collective is able to enact a complex pattern of individual actions. As I shall argue, shared knowledge of each other's actions and intentions is a crucial ingredient for such collective ability.
